The mission of the Hall Family Foundation, established in 1943, stems from the original purposes of its founders: Joyce C. Hall; his wife, Elizabeth Ann Hall; and his brother, Rollie B. Hall.

As outlined in the original bylaws, the Hall family intended that the Foundation should promote: the health, welfare, and happiness of school-age children; the advancement and diffusion of knowledge; activities for the improvement of public health; and advancement of social welfare. These objectives were based on a family resolve to help people and enhance quality of life. Eighty years later, their legacy lives on.

Joyce C. Hall was born on August 29, 1891, in David City, Nebraska. He was a plain-spoken individual with a respect for hard work and an unwavering commitment to quality. Mr. Hall came to Kansas City in 1910, and, starting with a shoebox full of cards and a rented YMCA room, began the business that was to become Hallmark Cards, Inc. In 1921, Joyce Hall married Elizabeth Ann Dilday. Together they built a life dedicated to family and community. Together they created the Foundation that nurtures and strengthens the city they loved.

Catalyst.

We see our role as developing and proposing ideas, connecting people, leading, and partnering, with the goal of advancing *all*.

Collaboration.

We believe it is important to work with individuals and groups representing different backgrounds, lived experiences, desires, interests, and challenges to learn and understand diverse perspectives and accomplish goals aligned with our mission and strategy.

I am honored to work alongside an amazing team. They push one another, and me, to ensure that each request is evaluated through multiple lenses and that we are thinking broadly, critically, and innovatively about the investments we make. Their unwavering belief in being part of the solution and prioritizing the goals of the Foundation allows us to drive daily toward the impact we seek to achieve.

As stewards of our founders’ intent, we recognize that we demonstrate our values through the investments we make. Our investments this year centered on partners who elevate community and participant needs, incorporate feedback across their programming, recognize that families do not live in silos, and are clear about their contribution to ensuring that *all people in Kansas City thrive*. To that end, grants in 2023 totaled \$52.8 million to 162 organizations across our three interconnected Impact Areas of *Growing Minds*, *Prospering Communities*, and *KC Spirit*.

Looking back at 2023 has allowed us to start looking to the future. We will continue to lean into this amazing and heavy privilege of philanthropy to recognize how our sector, and more importantly this Foundation, can positively impact our community. We are filled with optimism for the stories of hope and opportunity presented here in the Annual Report, and we are just as excited to celebrate those that continue to be written daily in our community.

Following the footsteps of our founders, we believe in uncompromising ambition and excellence. Our community demands that we continue to be courageous, to imagine a world of possibilities *for all*. We trust these stories will inspire you as they have inspired us.

Eastside University

Meet an organization focused on empowering youth to positively impact their community.

To help bring people together and *make the world better.*

When was the last time you stopped to talk to your neighbors? Not just to share a passing greeting, but to ask about their lives, talents, and experiences. Leave it to the next generation in the community to get the conversation started. Meet Eastside University. Founded by Pastor Darryl Answer of New Community Church and championed by the youth of the Eastside of Kansas City, Missouri, this neighborhood development program centers around two key priorities: youth empowerment and community transformation.

When asked about the purpose of Eastside University, eleven-year-old Riley summed it up in his own words: “To bring people together and to make the world better.”

At the heart of the organization are The Game Changers. These individuals, 10 to 18 years old, canvas the neighborhood conducting interviews with residents. These interviews serve as a powerful tool to create meaningful connections and broaden understanding within their neighborhood. The questions asked during these interviews vary, ranging from childhood memories to current pursuits. They are designed to foster a sense of unity through experience.

Eastside University’s impact extends beyond the interviews themselves. The Game Changers also take an active role in organizing events and programming within the community.

For Yahna Gibson, whose grandsons are active members of The Game Changers, what makes Eastside University unique is the sense of agency and empowerment the youth have to shape the world around them. “Typically, adults create programs for kids to be in; adults create the curriculum, and the kids just become participants in that. I think that’s a big difference about this program: this program is created and driven by the youth,” Gibson reflects.

Eastside University approaches the work differently. As Darryl Answer describes, “Asset-based community development is the process we use to discover and mobilize the gifts of people and place. It is done through the lens of abundance. It is a paradigm, not a program. This work is counter to most community work that begins with scarcity.” Through their participation in Eastside University, The Game Changers not only learn about asset-based community development, but they also develop skills related to public relations and the power of meaningful conversation.

As they continue to interview neighbors and build connections, The Game Changers strive to map the data they collect about the community, highlighting the commonalities linking residents. Stephanie Answer, co-founder of New Community Church and Eastside University, explains, “We want to map the abundance.”

Eastside University, driven by its mission to unite people and improve the world, serves as an inspiring model for community organization and youth development. The Game Changers, through authentic connections, are reuniting their community one conversation at a time. They embody unity, empathy, and leadership, forging a path toward a brighter future. Eastside University is not just changing the game; it is rewriting the rules of community engagement for generations to come.

Redefining what it means to lead.

Curious, humble, reflective, vulnerable, and loving – these are just a few of the words used to describe the leaders working with KC Uncornered, a local organization dedicated to addressing high crime rates in Kansas City. Striving to eradicate the root causes of violent crime, Uncornered stands out as it challenges conventional approaches to ending street violence. Built on the pillars of trust, empowerment, and a deep belief in every individual’s untapped potential, the organization centers those perceived to be driving violence - current or former gang members themselves - to become catalysts for positive change in their communities.

Putting the power of collaboration to work.

Uncornered partners with individuals, known within the program as Core Influencers and Catalysts, to become positive leaders in their community. Through their knowledge and insight, these leaders become the driving force behind the pursuit of peace through a paradigm-shifting concept – individuals helping each other break the cycle of violence.

Uncornered does not merely react to violent crime but strives to address the underlying conditions that give rise to it, including helping someone obtain a GED, ensuring stable housing, resolving personal conflicts, and facilitating job opportunities. It is dedicated to nurturing

positive change at its core, inspiring individuals to not only break free from the cycle of crime but also to become champions of their destinies – leading their communities by example.

In the words of Mark Culliton, Co-Founder of Uncornered, the organization’s role is to provide these leaders with the support and resources necessary for them to realize change for themselves and those around them to leave the streets for good.

“It’s about asking for their help to lead us in a different way. If you ask, ‘Will you help us?’ They’ll do anything to help the community, to help their neighborhoods.”

Working to address the root causes of violence in the community.

Catalysts for positive change.

Rather than imposing society’s expectations, Uncornered meets people right where they are and provides the individual support they genuinely need. By being responsive to the needs of participants and actively seeking feedback, Uncornered assists individuals in their pursuits, whether it is for their own growth or the betterment of their communities.

Scario, a Core Influencer at Uncornered, came to the organization with a deep desire for change. Having been involved in gangs since age 14, Scario was already transitioning out of gang activity when he discovered Uncornered. Tired of the stress, grief, and hardship of his former life, Scario learned to shift his mindset, embrace vulnerability, and approach conflict with curiosity rather than aggression through Uncornered’s training and workshops.

For DaMontay, a local Catalyst, Uncornered’s support has empowered him as he sought to rent an apartment, secure employment, and start building a plan for his future. As he says, Uncornered is not just an organization; it is a tight-knit group of “big brothers helping their little brothers achieve things they might never have thought possible. I was the kid who loved life, but it never loved me back. And eventually I lost the love for life, but I just kept going. I was blind without a plan before I met Uncornered, and now I have a vision with a motive.”

Uncornered envisions a vibrant community where neighborhoods are transformed through education and workforce pathways, ending generational cycles of poverty, violence, and lack of opportunity. The organization remains relentless, acknowledging the extensive work that lies ahead. Yet, fueled by the relationships forged among Core Influencers, Catalysts, and other network members, the dream of transformation is not just an aspiration but a tangible reality.

“As a Black man, we run from vulnerability; we always have the tough side. I started coming to the Uncornered workshops, and I was able to help the guys in my community. I was able to be an inspiration for the guys in my community and tell them, ‘Hey, I’m changing my mind, and if I can do it, you can do it too.’”

When you step into the heart of Kansas City, Kansas (KCK), you are welcomed by a community rich in cultural history. Residents, each with diverse backgrounds, untold experiences, and compelling stories, weave the tapestry known as ‘The Dotte.’ It is this tapestry that serves as the driving force behind the impactful work of Vibrant Health, a nonprofit organization and Federally Qualified Health Clinic nestled in Central KCK.

Driven by a dedication to amplify community voices and a commitment to addressing the health disparities facing residents of Wyandotte County, Vibrant Health has embarked on a mission to support the needs of residents beyond primary healthcare. With a 30-year presence in the community,

Vibrant Health delivers compassionate, inclusive healthcare to thousands each year—regardless of income, language, or background. Looking ahead, the organization has taken a proactive approach by developing place-based strategies to address social determinants beyond healthcare, thus improving its community in the process.

The catalyst for this work arises from the need for improved healthcare access in the Northeast KCK area. Health equity, for Vibrant Health, extends beyond physical structures and programs; it is a holistic community-wide initiative tackling issues impacting overall well-being. And who better to shape the development and execution of this initiative than the community members it will directly impact?

Building healthier families and a stronger community.



Partnership and collaboration leading to lasting impact.

Through a community development corporation arm, the Vibrant Community initiative will create a consolidated community hub developed within a single building armed with the resources to forge bridges and partnerships poised to confront larger community challenges.

For Patrick Sallee, President and CEO of Vibrant Health, it is about more than constructing a building; it is about propelling growth and fostering investment in the community—while staying deeply connected to the voices and needs of the community it serves.

The journey began with purposeful relationship-building, including site visits to cities engaging in similar work. A pivotal element of the Vibrant Community initiative materialized with the establishment of the Vibrant Community Advisory Council (VCAC)—a committee of 20 community members committed to improving healthcare access. Dr. Nozella Brown, a VCAC member, is passionate about her involvement in this initiative: “Vibrant Health’s approach was different – instead of determining what people needed, they worked with the community to provide services that the community needed and could be a part of.”

Prioritizing community-led endeavors, the VCAC emphasizes health equity and justice, seeking valuable input from the surrounding neighborhoods. VCAC members’ perspectives will play a direct role in shaping the collaborative efforts of Vibrant Health and the Vibrant Community initiative, striving to establish a healthier, more inclusive, and thriving environment for all.

From the perspective of Matt Kleinman, Director of Community Development, the goal is to empower the community to influence decisions about what happens next as this place-based health access initiative advances.

“By encouraging members to seek training opportunities, connecting them to resources, providing information, and considering their feedback, we’re building trust. Trust takes time, but we can build community now.”

Place-based health and community development strategies, like the Vibrant Community initiative, concentrate on specific geographic areas to address the underlying causes of health inequities and improve health outcomes. Vibrant Community’s strategy consists of a shared power structure to work upstream and improve access to health resources and healthcare.

Through these place-based healthcare access strategies and the anticipated community health hub, Vibrant Health strives to be a convener of resources, rather than the sole executor of the work. It aims to collaborate with existing organizations and individuals in Wyandotte County, utilizing their expertise to address community needs. This work exemplifies the importance of playing the long game: the complex challenges faced by KCK residents cannot be solved overnight, and it will take an entire community to envision the vibrant future that lies ahead.

**Jump Start to Learning, Club Lit,
Lead to Read KC, & Literacy KC**

Having strong young and adult readers is critical in the KC community. Meet four organizations encouraging everyone to put the power of literacy to work both in the classroom and in their everyday lives.

It was three months into the school year when five-year-old Leah picked up a book and delicately began to trace the letter on its page and sound out ‘A’. As she moved onto each subsequent letter, her face radiated growing confidence in the ability to understand her world differently through a newly developed skill. In the library nearby, eight-year-old Tomás excitedly checked out the next book in a fantasy series, eager to dive further into the new world he would read about among its pages. At a local business downtown, sixteen-year-old Diana finished up a job application and interviewed with the manager. And in the supermarket, father of three, Damien, checked the food labels to make sure the ingredients did not contain items to which his children were allergic.

Literacy is a crucial skill to navigate the world today. Reading not only provides access to information but it is also a portal to different worlds, allowing individuals to dream of what is possible. Proficiency in reading, writing, and comprehension is not just a set of skills; it is a powerful tool that enhances communication, broadens horizons, and opens the door to countless opportunities.

To effectively bridge literacy gaps within our community, a multifaceted approach is necessary. While each organization tackling this complex issue takes its own meaningful approach to improving literacy, they all understand that this is more than just reading and writing—it is about providing people with the tools to seek opportunity and build community *for all*.

Jump Start to Learning through the Shawnee Mission School District provides incoming kindergartners with the opportunity to practice literacy, numeracy, and social skills. Georgia Klos, a kindergarten teacher, is passionate about helping children expand their worlds through increased literacy skills.

“It’s all in their eyes. It’s all about the switch in their face. It really isn’t about what they say...I typically have to tell them, ‘You just read that!’ They are so focused on the letter, sound, word, sentence, story, that they are often unaware they are reading. It’s only about the visual ‘aha’ moment in their face. It is why I keep coming back! That, and the joy of watching them shift to becoming responsible selves and social human beings with others.”

Reading has the power to broaden horizons.



Across the city, Club Lit, a program operated by Boys & Girls Clubs of Greater Kansas City, works daily with Club members in grades kindergarten to third through a personalized approach in which tutors engage participants in one-on-one sessions or small workgroups, creating a comfortable environment that alleviates the pressure of reading in front of peers.

Reflecting on Club Lit’s impact, Kelley Barnes, Senior Director of Program Operations, emphasized, “By placing the right staff and resources in front of students, we can help boost their confidence. This, in turn, can foster a love of literacy.”

A love of literacy is evident in Lead to Read KC’s work to connect community volunteers with students for reading mentorship. Through its primary initiative of lunch-hour reading sessions, Lead to Read KC’s low-barrier time window, coupled with the guidance and support of staff, has been a key driver in fueling the growth of the program. According to former Executive Director Pauly Hart, it is the resonating need for literacy support that connects the organization’s mission to students, schools, and volunteers across Kansas City.



“Reading is one of the few issues out there that affects every single person in this community. There’s nobody who is untouched by low literacy skills — whether it’s the person who is a low-literate reader, the person who’s trying to hire a low-literate reader, or the person who’s trying to communicate with a low-literate reader. It’s a universal challenge, and that’s why it’s going to take the whole community to rally around it.”

In contrast to organizations and initiatives focused on the literacy of children, Literacy KC addresses a different, yet equally critical, demographic – adults struggling with low literacy skills. Literacy KC’s mission is to make the world more legible for its students, recognizing the diverse challenges they face.



As Gillian Helm, CEO of Literacy KC, explains, Literacy KC’s mission extends beyond reading and writing skills; it is about empowering individuals to create a better future for themselves and their families.

Supporting 2,000 adult learners from over 60 countries and speaking more than 40 languages, one of the most powerful aspects of Literacy KC’s work is its integration with the community. Student insights actively shape the program, with a student advisory committee leading the charge. From an expansion of workforce development programs to the inclusion of wraparound resources like a shelf-stable food pantry, students are not only learning, but they are also leading.

Increased literacy is not just about enhancing individual skills, it is about creating generational change and advancing collective well-being. Literacy is a cornerstone of social progress and an indispensable tool for building a more prosperous and equitable society. Literacy-focused organizations across Kansas City are making a profound impact on individuals, families, and the broader community for decades to come.

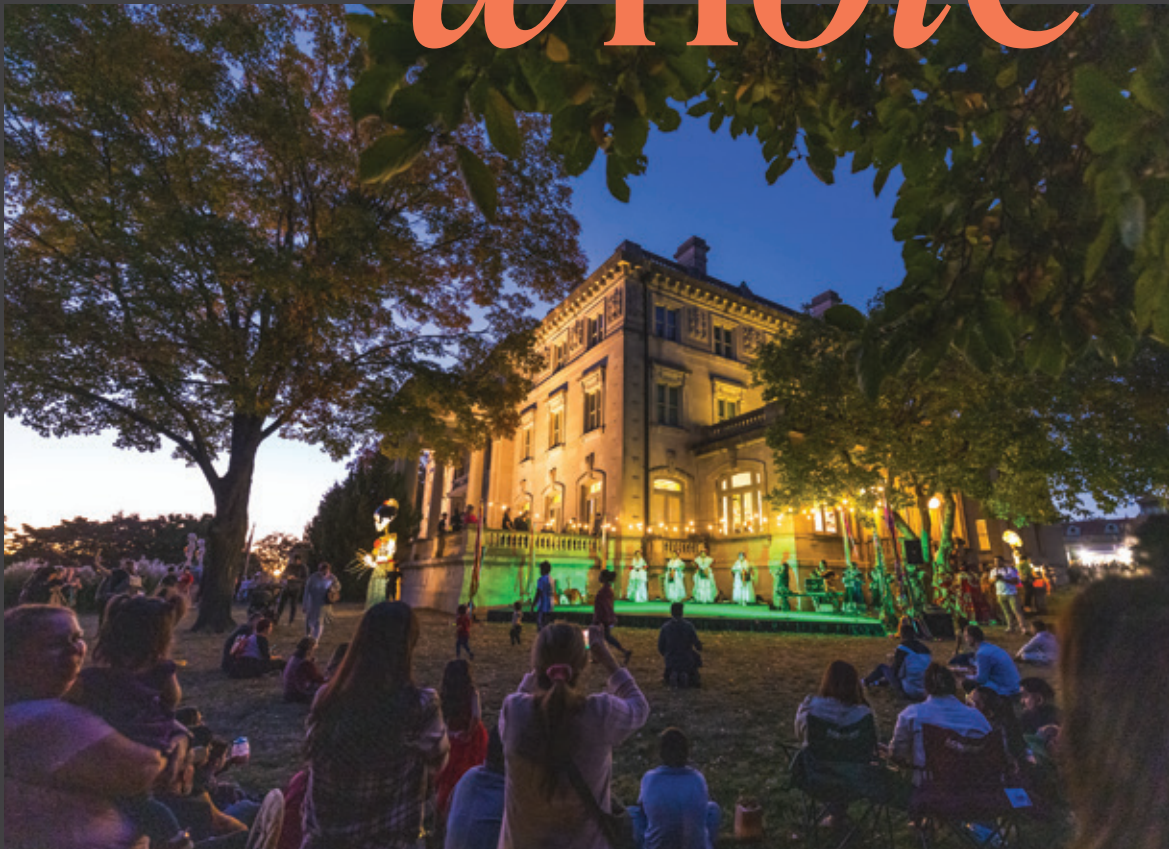

Through this firsthand knowledge, the Kansas City Museum is uplifting stories that are traditionally overlooked or excluded. This shift from the notion of history being something distant and long ago to something that continues to impact our city to this day makes it deeply personal.

A welcoming and respectful environment where individuals and communities can come together to listen and learn.

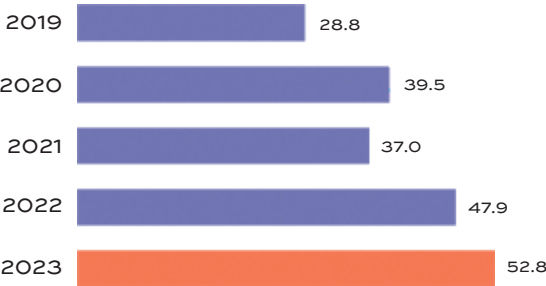

In Millions of Dollars*

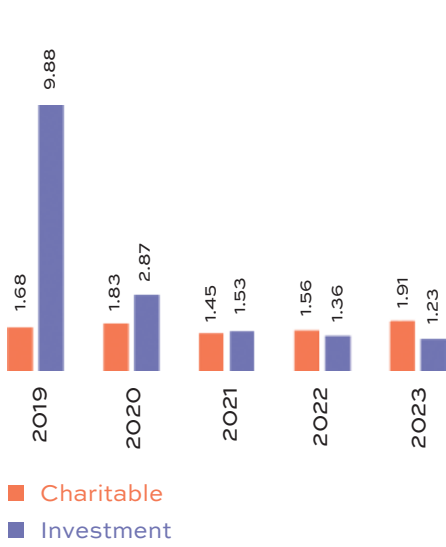


Income
